## May 18: Tom Stoppard's Rock 'n' Roll

Yeah, baby, he's rocking. The old wizard has salted this political play with songs from the sixties by The Beach Boys, Bob Dylan, The Grateful Dead, Jimi Hendrix, Pink Floyd, The Rolling Stones, and The Velvet Underground. It's about the relationship between art and politics—in this case, politics in Czechoslovakia from the Russian occupation in 1968 to the fall of the communist regime in 1989.

As in other Stoppard plays, *Rock 'n' Roll* doesn't observe the classic unities. It operates on several levels and over more than one generation. It's easier to understand if you read it before you see it. ### The Plastic People of the Universe

Stoppard was born in Czechoslovakia, but his family left when he was still a baby and he didn't visit the country again until 1977. Like the character Jan in the play, he was living in England and wanted to see how artists and writers were faring in Czechoslovakia. Did they go along with the regime and its phony "people's culture," or did they link up with the dissidents and risk imprisonment or exile?

One answer was supplied by a rock group called The Plastic People of the Universe, who cared nothing about

politics and simply wanted to be left alone. They weren't left alone, because the authorities saw them as a threat. They were arrested and put on trial as criminals. Vaclav Havel, a playwright who later became president of Czechoslovakia, took up their cause. He saw their trial as "an attack by the totalitarian system on life itself, on the very essence of human freedom and integrity."

As we know, the dissidents eventually toppled the communist regime. But The Plastic People of the Universe didn't care about that so long as they were free to play their music. As their leader wrote, "we live in an atmosphere of complete agreement: the [authorities] don't want us, and we don't want anything to do with the [authorities]. This eliminates the temptation that for everyone, even the strongest artist, is the seed of destruction: the desire for recognition, success, winning prizes and titles, and last but not least, the material security which follows."
